

Your Impact

With the Sisters you are impacting the lives of young women from Ethiopia to Baltic, CT, the small town where our school is located.

The Academy of the Holy Family, an all-girls' high school, owned, operated and staffed by the Sisters of Charity, has been true to its mission since its founding in 1874: to prepare girls to become faith-filled, professional young women, making their mark in society. Our graduates have been accepted at institutions of higher learning from Community Colleges to Harvard University. They presently serve in politics, medicine, research, academics, business - to name just a few of the areas where they are making a difference.

Always striving to be on the cutting edge of educational advancements, this year the administration and Board invited Mr. Henry Fiore, Jr. to join our team as principal of the school. Together with Sister Rafael, assistant principal, the administrative team, and the highly qualified faculty already in place, Mr. Fiore is bringing the school to the next level of academic excellence. "My primary goal," he says, "is to continue to grow the school population and provide for our students solid academic standards and a firm faith foundation."

Since joining our team in July, Mr. Fiore has been actively planning for the future - greater improvement in key areas that make for an effective Catholic school: Mission/Catholic Identity, Leadership, Academic Excellence and Operational Vitality. He continues: "My administrative team, faculty, staff and School Board have been working hard on updating the strategic plan in all aspects of our school. We are mission driven and high-achievement oriented with a definite vision for the future." The halls of the Academy are ringing with excitement and energy as the entire school community comes together to implement this vision.

Your financial and prayerful support makes all this possible. The operational vitality of AHF depends on charitable donations. Tuition alone does not cover the true per-pupil cost, especially given the increasing need each year for financial aid. ***Through your faithful generosity, you, with the Sisters and leaders like Mr. Fiore, are impacting the lives of young people in ways that you might not have imagined. You are reaching out to those in need

Bitter. Angry. Disrespectful. Foul-mouthed. Irresponsible. Uncooperative. Always ready for an argument— or even a fight. That is how Jacquana describes herself as the person she was when she came to Holy Family Home and Shelter. When she left the Shelter, 15 long months later, to finally move into an apartment of her own and get on with her life, both she and the staff saw a different person. She left the Shelter with more than an apartment. She left with a new lease on life, a positive attitude and skills to face the challenges of life.

The patience and tough-love of the staff, always shown with kindness, is what turned things around for Jacquana. She says: “The Shelter staff taught me to be responsible, to take charge of my life, to have a positive attitude regardless of the difficulties. They taught me to respect myself and others. I learned a lot about myself during my time here and I will always be grateful for the opportunity to have lived here. Now I am ready to move on with my life.”

Jacquana’s stay in the Shelter was unusually long, primarily because of COVID and its effects. COVID interrupted the lives of all of us. The marginalized, already struggling under the weight of many challenges, felt its ruthless effects more severely than many of us. Holy Family Home and Shelter was at the forefront providing support and aid with courage, creativity and consistency to those at risk of being homeless. We temporarily adjusted our mission of serving only families to include single women at risk of living in their cars or in tents. We negotiated with families (and their landlords) to take in family members, providing a stipend for them to cover their own expenses. These and many more creative initiatives we undertook with courage and determination to keep the homeless safe during the time of COVID. In October, the local Chamber of Commerce awarded the Shelter a certificate of Recognition for “Courage in the Face of COVID.”

In our more than 30 years of sheltering the homeless, *through the Sisters and the dedicated staff at Holy Family Home and Shelter, you have made and continue to make a world of difference in the lives of hundreds of people like Jacquana.* Thank you for standing with us in this very important ministry.

Here's what you accomplished

When the Sisters of Charity came to America from Holland 148 years ago, the main portion of what is now our Motherhouse was already here. It was a no-frills hotel purchased by the pastor of the parish church for the Sisters who would come to serve the needs of the people of this area. The building has seen many changes since then, but the basic structure remains.

Much has been done over the years to remedy things in need of replacement or repair, but, as Mother Mary David, Superior of the Motherhouse community here in Baltic often says: *"This house has good bones."* All the contractors who have worked with us agree.

In spite of the "good bones", though, there is always a need for important repairs. Through your faithful and gracious generosity, you have helped us keep "flesh" on these "good bones." ***Last year alone, 2021, these are just some of the things you helped us accomplish:***

- Remove and replace damaged slate on our Chapel roof
 - Replace the roof of the main section of our Motherhouse—a job more difficult than the workers anticipated.
 - Repair and re-pave the parking lot of St. Michael Center, the gymnasium-auditorium of our High School, built in 1981. The many potholes that developed over the years made it increasingly hazardous for both cars and pedestrians. We thought of you with gratitude as we watched the complicated process of leveling the parking lot to make it safe and beautiful once again.
 - Restoration of the cupola. You already know the story. It badly needed to be rebuilt, secured, and repainted. The Angelus bell now safely rings across the village and the cupola stands beautiful and secure - a testimony to your generosity.
- Changed / replaced / repaired hot water tanks and boilers in various wings of the school and Motherhouse.

None of this would be possible without you. Thank you for helping us keep "flesh" on these good, but old "bones" of our Motherhouse. We love these hallowed halls. So much good has happened here in the past: Sisters have served the poor, cared for infants during World War I, fed the survivors of hurricanes and taught generations of young women. And much good continues to happen here, even to this day—148 years later. ***Thank you for making it all possible.***

With two simple steps you will get to the chapel:


- Visit our website at www.sistersofcharity.com.

Pacis Animae—Latin for peace of soul. That is our prayer for you. That you always have peace of soul, no matter the struggles or difficulties that come your way. In our *Pacis Animae* shrine, when you light a candle, the Sisters of Charity will pray for you and your intentions. Virtual candles will “burn” for seven days in the chapel of the saint of your choice. We have chosen the saints most noted for assisting with the concerns you share with us when you have called our Development Office.

Below is a screenshot of what you will see when you “arrive” at the



homepage of the shrine. If you don’t see your favorite saint here, not to worry. We will be adding more chapels in the future. In the meantime, you can still light a candle in the chapel of the saint dearest to you – regardless of the intention. Visit our shrine, light a candle and say a prayer. Your intentions are sent to us. Know that the Sisters of Charity will be praying with you because ... ***you are our heroes!***

My Grandma's soups

What is your giving recipe? As a child, one of my favorite memories of my beloved grandmother was her delicious homemade soups. They were famous: Tortellini, Pasta Fagioli, Escarole. 

You make an irrevocable contribution of personal assets, including cash, stock, real estate and more. You immediately receive the maximum tax deduction that the IRS allows.



You name your Donor Advised Fund account advisors and any successors or charitable beneficiaries. Your contribution is placed in a Donor Advised Fund account where it can be invested and grow tax-free.



At any time afterward, you can recommend grants from your account to qualified charitable organizations.



Eliminate the paperwork and administrative tasks that go with donating to charity. Your DAF maintains your giving records in one place and makes it easy to prepare for tax season.
