Kayla and her husband lived in their car for three months before coming to Holy Family Home and Shelter. During that time their four children, ages 4-9, went from relative to relative. Kayla says the hardest thing for her during this time was not being with her kids but, she says, "we couldn't have them living in the car with us and no one was able to take in all six of us for more than a couple of days."

When there was an opening at the Shelter, we were able to receive

them as a family – all six of them. They have been at our shelter for four months and are very grateful for the chance to pick up their lives and start over.

With the help of the


Shelter's case manager and local agencies, Kayla will be in a new apartment in a couple of weeks.

family that did not provide a loving, nurturing home. Her mother was frequently ill and her father abused her in many sad, terrible ways. One day, when she was eleven years old, he tied her to a pole, taped her mouth closed and poured an entire bottle of Tabasco sauce into both of her ears.

She soon lost her hearing. Things for her continued getting worse. She was later placed in a loving foster family who helped her to receive her First Holy Communion. Linda says that was the happiest day of her life because "now I knew God would always be with me." *Cont'd on p. 3*

Linda later left the foster system and began to care for her mother who suffered from diabetes. She struggled to find enough food and medicine to keep her mother alive so she began to steal small amounts of food from the landlord. Finding that she could do so without being caught, she began to steal larger amounts. She was eventually found out, was arrested, and spent a year in prison for her 'crime'. When she was released, her Mom had died and Linda became homeless.

In her wanderings, she found her way to Willimantic, Connecticut, on the steps of a church, across the street from the Shelter. On the steps of the church, she felt near to God once again. She gazed across the street and thought: "That must be a shelter. I see nuns. Maybe they will take me in." Fearfully, she rang the doorbell and was welcomed by the staff. They promised to care for her and assist her in finding permanent, safe and affordable housing.

Linda often says: "This place saved my life!" *She* knows, and *we* know that your kindness proves that God is indeed very near to her and all those in need.

Your gifts help us daily to assist people, who, like Linda and Kayla, once found themselves alone, lost, hungry, sometimes threatened, and eventually homeless. We won't send street or tell them we can't do anything for them. You help us save lives and give hope. We give thanks for gentle, beautiful souls like Linda's and Kayla's, and for generous, beautiful souls like yours. Linda asked not to be photographed but she wanted you to know that you have saved her life.

### From the desk of Margaret Cuccinello, Director of Planned Giving

**D**very year around December 29<sup>th</sup> I get the dreaded question from friends and family: What are your New Year's resolutions? Do you make New Year's

resolutions? I do. You know the ones – lose a little weight, save some money, get more organized, etc. Do you keep them? I usually lose sight of my resolutions by mid-February. Perhaps they have become so routine and the same year after year that they lose their value. Each year I promise myself that I will do better.

Often, at the beginning of a new year, many people are inspired to reflect on the legacy they wish to leave behind. This can be a difficult topic, but it is one that is extremely important. Legacy giving has been a cornerstone of charitable contributions for centuries.

In the Catholic tradition, legacy giving is deeply rooted in the principles of stewardship and generosity. It is not just a financial transaction; it is a deeply spiritual act. By making a legacy gift, we embrace the virtue of stewardship, acknowledging that all we possess is a gift from God. It reflects a profound trust in an organization's ability to continue its mission of service and compassion. The act of legacy giving is a tangible expression of one's faith and commitment to the Church.

YOU are a very dear friend to the Sisters of Charity. You support us with your gifts and prayers. You give to make a difference in the lives of others – helping the Sisters serve God's little and least ones with caring and compassion. We are very blessed to have you share in our mission.

One of the most common forms of legacy giving, and one that I advocate for in my role as Director of Gift Planning, is giving through a bequest in a will. Bequests can be Restricted or Unrestricted. They can be Specific, Percentage, or Residuary.

**Unrestricted Bequests** are available for general use and can be applied where the need is greatest at the time the bequest is received.

**Restricted Bequests** are designated to an Endowment Fund or earmarked for a particular ministry of the Sisters of Charity.

A **Specific Bequest** directs an exact amount of money or a particular asset to the Sisters of Charity.

A **Percentage Bequest** designates a percentage of an estate rather than a specific dollar amount or specific item.

A **Residuary Bequest** is the part of an estate that is left after all expenses have been paid and other specific and percentage bequests have been distributed.

I am honored to assist our donors in finding peace and comfort in knowing that their bequest will not only align with their values and beliefs, but also leave a lasting impact on their family, friends, and organizations like the Sisters of Charity.

I hope you will be inspired to consider legacy giving as a natural and meaningful aspect of your faith journey, and may that journey be guided by hope, joy and peace. Please feel free to reach out to me at 860-822-6323 with your questions.
